ASU’s First Year Experience (FYE) program offers guidance and support to first-year students, helping them adjust and integrate into the college community. The FYE program goal is to make the first year a positive experience so that students return to ASU in pursuit of a college degree. The FYE program oversees two University Studies courses:

- **USTD 1201: Critical Thinking** This course is optional for all first-time entering students to assist and empower them with strategies to help them become more successful learners as they transition into and progress through their college career. The course will introduce theories of learning, cognition and motivation. Students will apply these theories to analyze and critically evaluate ideas, arguments and points of view while developing a link between their educational plans and occupational goals.
- **USTD 1101: Strategies for Learning** This course is mandatory for all freshmen on academic probation (GPA is below 2.00 but above 1.35). This course will introduce students to “learn how to learn” strategies they can apply and transfer to their other classes. Students will apply these learning strategies to decision-making activities while learning how to find and use resources for solving problems.

The Texas Success Initiative (TSI) assesses college readiness. Unless otherwise exempt, undergraduate students who enter public institutions of higher education will be tested for reading, writing and mathematics skills prior to enrolling in college-level courses. To satisfy this requirement, students will take a state-approved assessment test (THEA, ASSET, ACUPLACER or COMPASS). This process helps to ensure each student is ready to take college-level courses. Students who fail a section or sections of the test may be required to enroll in developmental education courses. The TSI advisor helps students determine what testing options are available and what students must do to demonstrate they are ready for college-level courses.
