COURSE DESCRIPTION: HONR 2305 is an introductory course for first-year Honors students emphasizing the development of critical thinking and oral and written communication skills through the framework of a humanities discipline. Topics and readings vary by semester.

COURSE STUDENT LEARNING OBJECTIVES: At the end of the course, students should be able to:

- demonstrate a basic understanding of the complexity of the course topic in specific settings and cultures
- demonstrate an awareness of historical, political, social, and cultural components of the topic under study
- critically analyze and evaluate sources from multiple genres relevant to the course topic
- acknowledge and respond to ethical dilemmas related to the course topic
- present information effectively in both written and oral formats

REQUIRED READING:

A common text determined in consultation with professors teaching the course each semester Supplemental texts or visual media chosen by the instructor from at least two different genres

COURSE PROCEDURE: Honors seminars are designed to encourage an interchange of ideas and to foster the development of critical thinking and communication skills. The instructor's primary role is to facilitate discussion of the texts and to provide suggestions and responses to students' independent and group work. Students will be expected to cooperatively engage in class discussion and activities and to bring insights from their specific disciplines into the discussion of the assigned works.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS/ASSIGNMENTS: Each student will be responsible for the following:

- 1. <u>Content Mastery:</u> Students will be expected to have a clear understanding of all assigned materials and be able to effectively respond to questions from the readings through class discussion, reading quizzes or journals, reflective writing assignments, and exams.
- 2. <u>Writing Assignments:</u> Students will complete at least one analytical paper and at least one reflection essay or policy statement responding to an ethical issue related to the course.
- 3. <u>Oral Presentation:</u> Each student will present in either an individual oral presentation or a group oral presentation.
- 4. <u>Daily Preparation and Performance</u>: Each student will be expected to respectfully listen to guest and student presentations, to complete reading and writing assignments prior to the assigned class period, and to actively and respectfully engage in class discussion. Factors that influence the preparation and performance grade include class attendance, the instructor's assessment of the frequency, quality, and relevance of contributions to class discussion and questions posed to guest speakers, and performance in oral presentations.

ATTENDANCE: Attendance and engaged participation are critical elements of Honors education. Students are expected to attend every session and arrive with assignments completed.
