Course Description

An examination of classic and contemporary theories of leadership, including their evolution and an analysis of strengths and weaknesses. Applications are made to real-world leaders and a critique of their effectiveness. Topics include leadership styles, personality, self-analysis, and perspectives of leadership across diverse individuals and groups.

Assignment and Activity Descriptions

***Please note: Rubrics for all assignments are located on BlackBoard.**

Quizzes: Over the course of the semester you will be given four quizzes. These will consist of 25 multiple choice, true/false, or matching questions. The questions will be pulled from any material covered during that week's material and are not cumulative in nature. You will be asked to use the Respondus LockDown Browser to take your quizzes and you will have 40 minutes to complete each quiz. You will be allowed to use the textbook during quizzes. Quizzes will open on Friday mornings and you will have until end of day Sunday to complete it.

Assignments: Each week, in addition to your reading and discussion board posts, you will complete a brief written assignment that relates to the content for that week. You will have the possibility of earning 25 points for each assignment. As stated above, I will not accept late assignments.

Discussion Board Posts: Each week you will be asked to respond to one of two discussion questions that I will post. Additionally, you will be asked to respond to at least one of your colleague's posts as well. You will be required to make 2 posts (one post and one reply) and each post is worth 5 points allowing you to earn 10 points from the discussion board each week. Each week, a post is due by end-of-day Thursday and any replies are due by end-of-day Sunday. For a grading rubric, please see the Discussion Board Rubric document on Blackboard.

Final Exam: At the end of the semester there will be a "take-home" written final. You will be given a selection of 5 questions that address material learned throughout the course and you will give written, essay style responses to 3 questions of your choosing. Each question will be worth 20 points allowing you to earn up to 60 points total.

Assignment Submission

All assignments MUST be submitted through the Assignments link in the Blackboard site. This is for grading, documenting, and archiving purposes. Issues with technology use arise from time to time.
