Course Description

The purpose of this course is to introduce basic theoretical concepts centering on tonal music. The course covers basic analytical techniques, small-scale form, the use of triads and seventh chords in all inversions, as well as typical harmonic progressions and voice leading practices. Students will learn to use the information covered in class to harmonize melodies/bass lines and analyze tonal compositions. Chapter exams, Musition assignments, and a final exam will be used to assess student learning.

Student Learning Outcomes

The student will demonstrate through application and analysis an understanding of the following:

- 1) Harmonic progression
- 2) Nonchord tones (non-harmonic tones)
- 3) Triads and seventh chords in root position and inversion
- 4) Harmonizing melodies and bass lines with acceptable voice leading (diatonic triads and seventh chords in all inversions)
- 5) Small scale form (cadences, phrases, periods, sentences)
- 6) First Species (1:1), Second Species (2:1), and Fourth Species (syncopated) counterpoint

IDEA Learning Outcomes

- 1) Gaining a basic understanding of the subject
- 2) Developing specific skills, competencies, and points of view needed by professionals in the field most closely related to this course
- 3) Developing creative capacities

Grading

Grading is based on the following point scale:

- Musition assignments (weekly 12 total) @ 20% (lowest 2 grades will be dropped)

- Final Exam (in class, Musition, Blackboard) @ 20%
- Attendance @ 10%
