Course Description

Intensive study of and practice in the strategies and techniques for developing research-based expository and persuasive texts. Emphasis on effective and ethical rhetorical inquiry, including primary and secondary research methods; critical reading of verbal, visual, and multimedia texts; systematic evaluation, synthesis, and documentation of information sources; and critical thinking about evidence and conclusions.

Prerequisites

Completion of ENGL 1301 or its equivalent.

Course Outcomes

Upon successful completion of this course, students will:

- 1. Demonstrate knowledge of individual and collaborative research processes.
- 2. Develop ideas and synthesize primary and secondary sources within focused academic arguments, including one or more research-based essays.
- 3. Analyze, interpret, and evaluate a variety of texts for the ethical and logical uses of evidence
- 4. Write in a style that clearly communicates meaning, builds credibility, and inspires belief or action.
- 5. Apply the conventions

ASU Core Curriculum Objectives

The ASU Core Curriculum Committee has designated English 1301 as a core course in the area of Communication1. According to the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board, courses in this foundational component area should "focus on developing ideas and expressing them clearly, considering the effect of the message, fostering

understanding, and building the skills needed to communicate persuasively" and should "involve the command of oral, aural, written, and visual literacy skills that enable people to exchange messages appropriate to the subject, occasion, and audience." In addition, every core course must help students develop four of the broad core objectives. The four designated for this class are

- **Critical Thinking Skills** To include creative thinking, innovation, inquiry, and analysis, evaluation and synthesis of information;
- Communication Skills To include effective development, interpretation and expression of ideas through written, oral and visual communication;
- **Teamwork** To include the ability to consider different points of view and to work effectively with others to support a shared purpose or goal; and
- **Personal Responsibility** To include the ability to connect choices, actions, and consequences to ethical decision-making.

All student learning outcomes and course policies are designed to foster student growth in these four skill areas. Attached to this syllabus is the rubric used by the Department of English and Modern Languages to assess core outcomes in this class.
