Should a student be unable to perform a task due to the lack of tools and materials, he or she may be asked to leave the class. In which case, the student will be marked absent.

Course Description:

An introduction to practical makeup design principles and application techniques.

Student Learning Outcomes: By the end of this course, the student will be able to:

- 1. Understand the history and function of makeup for stage and film and its relevance to modern usage through lecture and reading.
- 2. Design and apply both corrective and character makeup on themselves and other actors through projects 1-8.
- 3. Maintain and use a compiled makeup morgue through on-going research and development throughout the semester.

In-Course Technology: We will utilize Blackboard, Basecamp, and email for this course. WORKING EMAIL REQUIREMENT: It is a course expectation that you have a working email address that you check daily. If you have not already acquired an email address through the university or otherwise, please make arrangements to do so before the next class meeting. There WILL be times that I need to contact you with important information and email is often the speediest and easiest way of doing so. Additionally, I will provide electronic copies of and any supplemental reading through Blackboard and/or email.

WRITTEN WORK: Unfortunately, papers/projects do occasionally get lost. Please, for your sanity, save your work on a thumb drive, etc. Do not depend on your paper staying on the hard drive of any university computer, as it will be deleted, altered, or worse – turned in by someone else as their work! Be aware that it is a course expectation that you keep copies of your assignments until you receive your final grade for the semester. Your makeup morgue will be turned in on a USB thumb drive.

Content Disclosure: Courses within the Department usually deal with works of dramatic literature, both on the page and on the stage. Sometimes the situations, actions, and language of these works can be off-putting or offensive to some students, who might be offended on such grounds as sexual explicitness, violence, or blasphemy. As the Department is devoted to the principle of free expression, artistic and otherwise, and it is not the Department's practice to censor these works on any of these grounds, students who might feel unduly distressed or made uncomfortable by such expressions should withdraw at the start of the term and seek another course.

Electronics Policy: Cell phone use is not permitted in the classroom or during any class activity. Phones and other electronic devices are to be turned completely off (not just silenced) the moment you enter the studio and must remain off during the class period. Likewise, text messaging is prohibited in the classroom or during any class activity. Students utilizing the phone or messaging during class will be asked to leave the classroom and will receive an absence for the day. Messaging during an exam/performance will be considered an act of academic dishonesty. Computers can be used in class for the purpose of note taking and

research. Students misusing their computers (i.e. being on-line, or on social media) will lose their computer privileges for the duration of the course. Be physically and mentally present.

PROJECT GRADING GUIDELINES- WORK DONE AS TAUGHT IN CLASS

- 1. Paperwork- 15% Paperwork DONE BEFORE CLASS, on time and thoroughly completed, STAPLED TOGETHER, with your name on all sheets Paperwork includes:
 - The character profile sheet
 - The Makeup color chart
 - A COLOR photocopy (or photo) of the assigned work *
- *See projects #2, 5, 6, 7, 8, and Final project (If no paperwork is required (Projects #3 & 4) the grading % will increase for each of the other guidelines by 5%)
- 2. Completion- 15% Design completed in the time allotted.
- 3. Neatness and Readability-35% Work neatly done and appropriate for the theatre space in which it will be used.
- 4. Creativity- 35% Creativity used in designing the character. Work well planned and well executed. Complexity of the work.

Attendance Policy: You may accumulate three (3) absences before any penalty occurs. You are allowed 3 absences for whatever reason. There are no additional absences allowed without penalty. Plan accordingly. There is no such thing as an "excused" absence. Any absences after that will result in a 50 point deduction. For this class, 7 absences will result in an F for the course, regardless of your grade.

Tardiness: Students who are not in class, ready to start at the beginning of class will be marked tardy. For every three times tardy, the student will be marked absent. This class is demonstration based, and extremely difficult to make up or reshow demonstrations. Please plan accordingly. Do not expect the instructor to reteach a demonstration because you arrive late. It is disruptive to the class.

Late Work: Late work is not accepted unless it is agreed upon between the student and myself beforehand.

PROJECT GUIDELINES

*** I will not accept an assignment without a printed picture where indicated.

Project #1 Corrective Makeup Techniques 50 points

Design corrective makeup for your own face using your headshot and a piece of tracing paper. Fill out character profile and color chart. Design must be colored to show application placement. Following the methods taught in class, you will execute this design in a portion of

one class period and be critiqued according to the guidelines. Paperwork and design sheet WILL BE CHECKED AT THE BEGINNING OF CLASS and will be handed in at the time of your critique.

Project #2 Age Makeup Techniques 100 points

Find a close-up picture of one of your older relatives that looks the most like you. Use this picture to design age makeup for your own face using that photo, your headshot and a piece of tracing paper. Fill out character profile chart and color chart. Design must be colored to show application placement. Following the methods taught in class, you will execute this design in a portion of one class period and be critiqued according to guidelines. Paperwork and design sheet WILL BE CHECKED AT THE BEGINNING OF CLASS and will be handed in at the time of your critique.

Project #3 Partner work 50 points

Do an age makeup on a fellow student. You will be graded on your ability to apply the makeup and the manner in which you work with them.

Project #4 Stout/Slim 50 points

Apply makeup to your face to make yourself appear more stout and more slim according to instructions given in class.

Project #5 3D Makeup Techniques 100 points

Find and print pictures of wounds, burns, scars, etc. Design a makeup for your face using your headshot and a piece of tracing paper. You must use at least three of the 3-dimensional techniques covered in class. Fill out a character profile and color chart. You will have one inclass workday but you may need to schedule additional time to work on your appliances. Following the methods taught in class, you will execute this design in a portion of one class period. It will be important for you to design with this in mind and come to class with items prepared ahead of time. You will be critiqued according to the guidelines. Paperwork, picturesand design sheets WILL BE CHECKED AT THE BEGINNING OF CLASS and will be handed in at the time of your critique.

Project #6 Animal Makeup 50 points

Find and print pictures of an animal according to the guidelines discussed in class. Use the picture to design a makeup for your face from a picture of an animal of your choice. You will be graded on your choice of animal and your creativity in bringing that animal alive on your face according to instructions given in class.

Project #7 Specialty Makeup 100 points

Find and print pictures of different world theatrical makeup traditions. Use makeup to change your face to match the clown picture according to instructions given in class.

Project #8 Cross gender Makeup- 50 points

Find and print pictures of a relative of the opposite gender that you most resemble. Use makeup to change your gender according to the instructions given in class.

FINAL PROJECT

Play or movie or comic or cartoon etc character- 200 points

- 1. Choose a character and find and print a picture of that character from a play or movie.
- 2. Write a 1-page typed character analysis
- 3. Fill out a character profile chart and color chart. Design schematic must be in color to show application placement.
- 4. You may choose to do any of the techniques that were covered in class. You must include at least 1 3-dimensional technique.
- 5. There will be at least one in-class workday for the final projects but you may need extra time to work on appliances.
- 6. Following the methods taught in class, you will execute this design during the final exam time. It will be important to design with this in mind and come to class with items prepared ahead of time. You will be critiqued according to guidelines.
- 7. Paperwork and design sheets ARE TO BE APPROVED AT LEAST A WEEK BEFORE THE FINAL CLASS PERIOD, WILL BE CHECKED AT THE BEGINNING OF THE EXAM and will be handed in at the time of your critique.
- 8. Creativity is a very important element in this project. Use your imagination!!

A MAKEUP MORGUE IS REQUIRED FOR THIS CLASS

(100 points)

The Makeup Morgue is:

A jump drive containing a power point of labeled and indexed pictures (minimum of 10 per subcategory). All pictures should be close-ups so that facial features are clearly seen. You may put several pictures on a page as long as the features are CLEAR and large enough to be useful.
