PSY 2319 22000 – Social Psychology Spring 2022

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Course Information

Social psychology is the study of how people think, feel, and behave in the real or imagined presence of other human beings. Social psychologists use scientific methods to understand and apply principles of human interaction.

This course conveys three major domains of social psychological inquiry: social thinking (e.g., what do people know about themselves and others?), social influence (e.g., what affects thought and behavior?), and social relations (e.g., why do people feel negatively or positively about particular others?). Within each domain, students explore theories and research that characterize the field of social psychology.

Learning in this course occurs by establishing familiarity with concepts, critically evaluating those concepts, and integrating them with students' personal interests to create something novel. The course emphasizes the importance of these practices to the advancement of social psychology and to students' professional development.

Course Description from RamPort

A survey of environmental forces as they affect individual and group behavior. Topics to be studied include subcultural influences, group dynamics, attitude change, interpersonal attraction, prosocial behavior and health. (Credit may not be earned for this course and Sociology 2326.)

Course Delivery

This is a lecture and discussion course that incorporates digital slideshows, physical handouts, and interactive demonstrations. I will post all handouts, but not slideshows, to <u>Blackboard</u>. Each student is responsible for understanding the content presented in class as well as the textbook content.

Prerequisite Skills

Accessing Internet websites, using ASU Library resources, navigating ASU's <u>Blackboard</u> learning management system, and proficiency with Microsoft Word and PowerPoint are expectations of the Department of Psychology.

Teaching Strategies

Students are expected to be "active learners." It is a basic assumption of the instructor that students will be involved (**beyond the materials and lectures presented in the course**) discovering, processing, and applying the course information using peer-review journal articles, researching additional information and examples on the Internet, and discussing course material with their peers.

Assignment and Activity Descriptions

Exams

Each student will complete three noncumulative exams. Each exam consists of 50 multiple choice questions. Students must supply their own Scantron forms and pencils for each exam. Together, the three exams comprise 45% of the final course grade (i.e., each exam is worth 15%). The instructor will post exam study guides to Blackboard to facilitate students' understanding of course content. Students can earn bonus points on their exams by submitting original, detailed, and completed study guides via Blackboard before 10:00 a.m. on the exam date.

Research Proposal

Each student will prepare a research proposal. Students will formulate and describe how they would address their own social psychological research questions. There will be three separate deadlines for this proposal: one for formulating a research question and selecting a research method, one for describing anticipated findings and their implications for social psychology and for everyday life, and one for a final written product. Together, these three assignments are worth 15% of the final course grade (i.e., each assignment is wroth 5%).

Social Psychology In My Life Assignments

Students will complete three "social psychology in my life" assignments throughout the semester. Together, these assignments will comprise 15% of the final course grade (i.e., each assignment is worth 5%). Students will respond to prompts promoting application of social psychological concepts to personal interests and experiences. These assignments develop students' written communication and critical thinking skills. First, students will indicate and describe a social psychological concept from class that interests them. Second, students will describe how that concept applies to or explains a personal experience or observation about social behavior. Third, students will articulate two research questions related to the concept.

Empirical Analyses

The instructor will present and discuss three empirical social psychological research articles in class throughout the semester. The student's task is to write an 8-to-12-sentence *analysis* (not just a summary) of the empirical article. This analysis provides students the opportunity to ask or answer a follow-up research question (e.g., "How else could researchers manipulate feelings of power? A subtle priming manipulation would allow for less resource intensive data collection and a larger sample size..."), make an original point (e.g., "I believe this study was flawed because...and I would improve it by..."), or apply the results of the study to their own life (e.g., "I found this study interesting or personally relevant because..."). Together, these three assignments will comprise 15% of the final course grade (i.e., each assignment is worth 5%).

Implicit Bias Assignment

Each student will apply class concepts and practice critical thinking by reflecting on their results from two implicit association tests (IATs). Each student will select any two IATs to complete from the Project Implicit website. After completing their two IATs, students will submit a written assignment that (1) states which IATs they completed, (2) describes whether and why they were/were not surprised by their

results, (3) explains whether they believe the results to reflect their social attitudes accurately, or whether they remain skeptical about their results, and (4) provides one thoughtful reason why the IAT might be an *accurate* measure of social attitudes, and one thoughtful reason why the IAT might be an *inaccurate* measure of social attitudes. This assignment is worth 5% of the final course grade.

Syllabus Quiz

Each student will submit a take-home syllabus quiz to enhance and demonstrate their awareness of their expectations in this course. The syllabus quiz is worth 5% of the final course grade.

Extra Credit

Students may earn up to 5 extra credit points by earning SONA research participation credits. Students can access the ASU's <u>SONA System</u> by logging in with their @angelo.edu email address. Each completed SONA credit applied to this course (PSY 2319 – Livingston) is worth 1% added to students' final course grade (maximum 5). Thus, a student who earns 88% (B) in the class and completes 2 Sona credits will receive a final course grade of 90% (A).

Assignment Submission

All electronic assignments MUST be submitted through the Assignments link in the Blackboard site. This is for grading, documenting, and archiving purposes. Issues with technology use arise from time to time. This report indicates to your professor that you completed the assignment on time but had trouble using the online submission feature in Blackboard. Once the problem is resolved, submit your assignment through the appropriate link. This process will document the problem and establish a timeline. Be sure to keep a backup of all work.

Late Work and Missed Assignments Policies

Each student is entitled to one "extra time pass" on an assignment of their choosing, apart from any assignment due after Thursday, April 28. The extra time pass allows students to submit an assignment after its deadline without penalty. To utilize their extra time pass, students must (1) inform the instructor of their decision via email *prior to the assignment deadline*, and (2) provide the instructor with a new deadline for the assignment. The new deadline must be before Thursday, April 28. Students may not apply extra time passes retroactively on assignments whose original due dates have already passed.

The instructor will deduct 10% per day from the final score of all late assignments not subject to an extra time pass. All missing assignments will receive a score of 0% (F).
