Learning Outcomes:

- 1. Students should be familiar with the biological and economical considerations of range improvements, the different methods of range improvements, and an integrated approach to range management.
- 2. Students should be able to evaluate rangelands and determine when invasive plant removal is necessary and beneficial.
- 3. Students should be able to calculate costs/gains of range improvements to determine economic feasibility of the proposed improvements.

*Learning outcomes will be assessed through questions on section/lab quizzes tied to outcomes as well as the range improvement project.

Lab: In the first half of the semester, laboratory meetings will be used to introduce students to the methods of range improvements. Labs will be designed so that students will have experienced the application of each technique.

For the second half of the semester, lab will consist of working in groups on developing range improvement plans. Each group will be assigned an area of rangeland and will be expected to develop a plan of improvement that is both economically and environmentally feasible. Each group will give a formal presentation to the class at the end of the semester, and each student will be expected to write an individual plan.

Readings: Readings will be assigned throughout the semester. The following class period, a quiz and/or discussion questions will be completed. Read each paper carefully to be prepared for these assignments.

Attendance: Each student has the opportunity to miss lecture or lab a total of 3 times. Official school trips do not count toward your absences. If you have a legitimate reason to miss a class, please let me know beforehand and we will make arrangements to complete assignments/exams before the absence. Missed assignments or exams not taken or turned in on time can only be made up within ONE week of the absence for a maximum of 80%. If you are sick and miss an exam, I will need a doctor's note to allow you to make up the exam for full credit. If you miss more than 3 class/lab meetings, you will lose 5 points from your final grade. For each absence thereafter, you will lose 1 point/absence.
