Topic Outline

This course will be focused on integrating current genetic research findings and understanding with the student's thesis project. As such, the student will be responsible for identifying relevant peer reviewed research (lit review) related to their thesis topic and providing a verbal presentation of their literature review.

Course content is organized into four modules covering the highlighted textbook information and will be supplemented with relevant articles and media. The following is subject to change at the instructors discretion.

Journal presentation

Each week, students are expected to find a peer reviewed genetics article that is related to their thesis topic. Students will provide an oral summary of the article and it's relevance to their thesis topic.

Thesis integration and presentation

Students will prepare a 15-20 minute presentation that incorporates their understanding of genetics as it relates to their thesis topic. The presentation will be organized into four sections that mirror the module organization of the course.

Section 1: research Section 2: function Section 3: environment Section 4: behavior

Students are expected to be "active learners." This is especially true of a graduate class.
