Teaching Strategies

Students are expected to be "active learners." It is a basic assumption of the instructor that students will be involved (**beyond the materials and lectures presented in the course**) discovering, processing, and applying the course information using peer-review journal articles, researching additional information and examples on the Internet, and discussing course material and clinical experiences with their peers.

Assignment and Activity Descriptions

Exams: 2 Exams at 150 points each for a total of 300 points

Both the mid-term and final will be on BlackBoard. The Mid-term will open on Wednesday 2/16/2020 by 6 pm., and will be due Saturday 2/20/2022 by Midnight. The Final will open Tuesday 3/8/2022 by 6pm., and will be due Friday 3/11/2022 by Midnight. You can use your notes or books when taking the exams; however, you may not use the assistance of another person to complete the exam. Each exam has a 120-minute time limit.

Quizzes: 7 Quizzes at 40 points each for a total of 280 points

Quizzes will open at 12:00 am (Midnight) on Wednesdays will close at 11:59 pm on Sundays, except for Quiz 7 will close on Friday, 3/11/2022. You can use your notes or books when taking the quizzes; however, you may not use the assistance of another person to complete the quizzes. Each quiz has a 60-minute time limit. You may try 2 attempts at each quiz; however, thelast attempt will be graded.

Case Studies: 7 Case Studies at 40 points each for a total of 280 points

You will have 7 case studies throughout the course. These will be based on the lectures that are covered each week and will require some critical thinking on real-world applications pertaining to each particular career path. Some are short and contain only a few questions, while others are a bit longer and will have several scenarios to work through.

Research Paper: The Research paper is worth 140 points

Provide a **5-7** page paper (not including your cover and reference page) on the healthcare profession that most aligns with your career goals. Students need to use a minimum of 3 references to document the information provided to address the topics. This paper should be double spaced, with 1" margins, either Calibri or New Times Roman font that is 12 point in size. The paper should be written using APA guidelines and must include a Cover and a Reference Page.

Some topics to address include but are not limited to:

- Why are interested in this particular profession?
- Description of the profession.
- What is the job market need (job prospects)?
- Describe the competiveness to be accepted into the field of study (ex: acceptance rates, GPA required)
- Prerequisites for acceptance into the professional program (medical school, PA school, PT school etc)
- Are you required to take an additional entrance exam? (GRE, MCAT, etc)
- Describe how many years of education are required.
- Where do professionals work (Ex: Physical Therapist: 15% hospitals, 65% clinics, etc)
- What are the estimated educational costs?
- What are average salaries in Texas and throughout the country?
- What are the educational and legal requirements to become and continue practicing as this particular professional?
- What steps and timeline do you plan to implement in order to reach your professional goals?

First Draft- 40 points
Final Draft- 100 points

All assignments MUST be submitted through the Assignments link in the Blackboard site. This is for grading, documenting, and archiving purposes. Issues with technology use arise from time to time.
