COURSE INFORMATION

Catalog Description: Provides a biopsychosocial perspective on human sexuality across the lifespan. Topics include the male and female sexual anatomy/physiology, multicultural perspective of sexuality, sexual behavior, sexual orientations, sexuality across the life cycle, the prevention and treatment of sexuality problems, and social problems related to human sexuality.

Course Overview: This online course is an exploration of human sexuality from biological, psychological, and social perspectives. Several critical issues directly or indirectly related to sexual behavior are examined. Students in this class will be exposed to many different types of sexual behaviors and beliefs. Topics surveyed include perspectives on sexuality, sexual anatomy and physiology, sexual arousal and response, love and communication, sexual orientation, contraception, reproduction, sexual difficulties and solutions, and atypical sexual behaviors.

Informed Consent Statement: This course relies, in part, on the use of explicit visual teaching aids such as pictures in your textbook and video clips on the BB. These materials portray nudity and examples of sexual behavior. Every effort is made to present such materials in a mature and scientific manner. Also, some topics such as homosexuality and masturbation may be offensive to some. A person who would be offended by open discussions and/or visual portrayals of human sexual behavior is not a good candidate for this class. In order to gain knowledge and enjoy learning about one of the most important aspects of human life, students will need to exercise a mature attitude, have an open mind, and be respectful of others' opinions and comments.

Further, students are expected to conduct themselves in a professional manner which is appropriate at a college level. All discussions and writing assignments will be presented at an objective, clinical, and academic level. No personal remarks will be made and no personal stories will be presented. I will not respond to any requests for counseling for any personal problems. Please contact ASU Counseling Center for any such needs. All forums will maintain interpersonal respect and professional tone. If any student violates these etiquettes, Dr. Singg reserves the right to drop him/her from the class.

Goals and Objectives: Specific objectives of the course are

- (1) gaining basic knowledge about human sexuality,
- (2) developing knowledge/understanding of diverse perspectives/cultures about human sexuality, and
- (3) learning to apply course material to human sexuality issues.

Student Learning Outcomes: Upon successful completion of Human Sexuality at the Angelo State University, students will be able to

- (1) have a basic understanding of sexual diversity as it exists in various subcultures within the United States,
- (2) describe the structure and function of various parts of the female/male sexual anatomy,
- (3) have a basic understanding about the male/female sexual response cycle at different ages,
- (4) have a basic knowledge about various contraceptive methods and reproduction issues,
- (5) be able to distinguish between sex and gender, gender identity and gender role, and biological and cultural perspectives about the formation of gender-identity,
- (6) have a basic knowledge about different forms of love and effective sexual communication.

- (7) have basic knowledge about common sexual behaviors,
- (8) have a basic knowledge about types of sexual orientation, and
- (9) have a basic knowledge about sexual problems, solutions and atypical sexual behavior.

Method of Assessing Learning Outcomes: Learning outcomes will be assessed via exams, writing assignments, and discussion participation.

Competencies Needed: You must have prerequisite skills of using Blackboard, proficiency with Microsoft Word, and using ASU Library resources. It is also most important that you know the terms of the syllabus of this course. Therefore, a "Know-the-Course Test" is required of everyone, which will cover the syllabus, Blackboard map, and important requirements of this course. The online course format requires access to a fully functional PC and a lot of self-discipline for the timely completion of exams, discussions, and writing assignments.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

- 1. In order to successfully complete this course, you must visit the Blackboard course site on a regular basis, and participate in all discussions and assignments. All course work has specific due dates specified in the syllabus and due dates document.

equipment]. Use of another electronic device is prohibited.


