Course Information

Course Description

This course is an introduction to the counseling profession. We will review all aspects of the profession including specialty areas and general functions of the professional counselor. We will examine the role of counselors as related to other profession in various areas of the mental health field. Of particular focus will be to explore the personal qualities of the counselor including the influence of personal background, culture, and values on their professional role. A review of counseling theories, ethics, and scope of the field will be included.
