#### **Course Description**

The biopsychosocial science base of social work practice; includes a critical analysis of the interactions between the person and the dynamic nature of groups, organizations, communities, society, and economic systems. Focuses on multiple dimensions of the person and the range of social systems in which they live. Prerequisite: SWK 3307

#### **Course Introduction**

This course offers a critical examination of the dynamic nature of person-in-environment transactions. These dynamic transactions that occur include those between the biological, psychological, and spiritual person and others, the family, small groups, organizations, communities, social institutions, culture, and so forth. Further, this course takes a multidimensional perspective that allows for breath and depth when considering personal, environmental, and the time dimensions of human behavior in the social environment.

#### **Course Credits**

This is a 3 credit course.

SWK 3307—HBSE I is a prerequisite to this course.

# Group Work 10%

Students will engage in weekly group work to work on PIE assignments and other theoretical concepts. Students will be assigned to a group and members will take turns being the group leaders.

## HBSE II, the PIE Assessment Interview (20%) and Term Paper (20%) 40%

Each student will interview an adult peer in the Library or other appropriate place. This will help maintain your client's confidentiality. Each student will use the Person In Environment Theory and assessment. This assignment is an opportunity to critically evaluate and apply HBSE concepts in a laboratory practice environment. Each student will record their assessments and upload into blackboard through Kaltura or collaborate (instructions will be posted on blackboard). Each student will write a paper that will include research regarding a specific problem that their client is living with such as i.e. poverty, mental health, criminal justice, physical health issues, diversity issues, etc. The student will conduct research on said problem and summarize their findings (5 peer reviewed Articles/texts/journals is the minimum for this paper). The student will also discuss the Person in Environment (PIE) theory, all Factors of the theory, and their engagement, assessment, and intervention of the selected individual.

Plagiarism is the presentation of someone else's information as though it were your own. If you use the words or ideas of another person; or if you use material from any source-whether a book, journal, magazine, newspaper, business publication, broadcast, speech, electronic media, or any other source--you must acknowledge that source. Plagiarism on the term paper will result in the student not receiving credit for her/his term paper.

#### HBSE II—Quizzes 10%

Weekly quizzes will be given to assess students reading of class assignments. One attempt will be allowed, no textbook and/or other resources will be allowed.

Examinations 40%

There will be four (4) online, closed book, multiple choice, exams in this course. Each of these examinations are worth 10% of your total course grade, and are time limited. You may have one (1) attempt for each exam. *You will not be allowed to use books, notes, ppts, or any other type of assistive materials*. You will take each of these examinations via Blackboard using the Respondus LockDown browser/monitor.

### Testing via Respondus<sup>TM</sup> Monitor

Access to Examinations/quizzes will be through Respondus<sup>TM</sup> Lockdown Browser and will be video recorded via Respondus<sup>TM</sup> Monitor [See Other Required Materials for a list of needed equipment]. Use of another electronic device is prohibited.

There are two practice quizzes: a) one is a Webcam test and b) a short 10 question practice quiz over ASU trivia that is not graded. These tools will be available to the student to assure accessibility. Students are highly encouraged to go through these practice quizzes in advance of taking a graded quiz. This process will allow you to become familiar with the technology associated with testing and improve the testing environment. These quizzes, instructional videos, and more information regarding Respondus Monitor can be found under the Respondus Monitor Help tab in your Blackboard course.

#### **Teaching Strategies**

This course is a face to face course, we will meet on Mondays, Wednesdays, and have group work every Friday. Students will be expected to participate in all group work assignments. Students are expected to be "active learners." It is a basic assumption of the instructor that students will be involved (**beyond the materials and lectures presented in the course**) discovering, processing, and applying the course information using peer-review journal articles, researching additional information and examples on the Internet, and discussing course material and clinical experiences with their peers.

Please note: Students with more than 5 unexcused absences since the return to full on campus classes (Fall 2021) will automatically lose points for professional performance. Students with more than 7 absences will receive zero points for professional performance. Students with 10 or more absences will receive a failing grade for the course
