Course Description

3357 Social Work Research Methods II (3-0). Presentation of selected statistical methods used in scientific inquiry, program evaluation, and knowledge of how statistical analysis informs social work practice. Focuses on the skills related to statistical analysis, interpretation, and application. Ethical, cultural, and professional value considerations in statistical analysis are emphasized.

Teaching Strategies

Students will be assigned to groups in which they will work collaboratively throughout the semester. Collaboration groups are meant to foster student communication and discussion about the material that might be difficult, unclear, and/or confusing. Participation will include weekly video posts and responses to group members. Students will grade one another on their overall semester participation in their collaboration groups. Examinations 60%

There will be two (2) online, closed book exams in this course. Each examination is worth 30% of your total course grade. You will have two attempts for each exam.

Exercises 30%

Student will be asked to complete various statistical exercises throughout the course using the Statistical package for the Social Sciences (SPSS). Exercises are taken directly from the Yockey textbook required for class.

Assignment Submission

All assignments **MUST** be submitted through the Assignments link in the Blackboard site. This is for grading, documenting, and archiving purposes. Issues with technology use arise from time to time.
