# **Course Description**

**3357 Social Work Research Methods II (3-0).** Presentation of selected statistical methods used in scientific inquiry, program evaluation, and knowledge of how statistical analysis informs social work practice. Focuses on the skills related to statistical analysis, interpretation, and application. Ethical, cultural, and professional value considerations in statistical analysis are emphasized.

### **Professional Performance (10%)**

#### Examinations (60%)

There will be three (3) online, closed book exams in this course. Each of these examinations is worth 20% of your total course grade. You will have one attempt for each exam. *You will not be allowed to use books, notes, ppts, or any other type of assistive materials*. You will take each of these examinations via Blackboard using the Respondus LockDown browser/monitor.

#### Exercises/Assignments (30%)

Student will be asked to complete various statistical exercises throughout the course using the Statistical package for the Social Sciences (SPSS). The exercises will be due on Sunday, on Fridays we will have an SPSS workshop for students who want help on the weekly assignment.

#### **Assignment Submission**

All assignments MUST be submitted through the Assignments link in the Blackboard site. This is for grading, documenting, and archiving purposes. Issues with technology use arise from time to time.
