# **Course Description**

**SOC 1306 Social Problems (3-0).** Study of social problems and issues facing the United States. Major problems and issues are analyzed and alternative solutions are evaluated. The course is designed for non-majors as well as majors.

### **Teaching Strategies**

Students are expected to be "active learners." It is a basic assumption of the instructor that students will be involved (**beyond the materials and lectures presented in the course**) discovering, processing, and applying the course information using peer-review journal articles, researching additional information and examples on the Internet, and discussing course material and clinical experiences with their peers.

# **Assignment and Activity Descriptions**

#### Examinations (30%)

There will be two (2) online, closed book, essay exams in this course. Each of these examinations is worth 15% of your total course grade. You may have ONE (1) attempt for each exam. You will not be allowed to use books, notes, ppts, or any other type of assistive materials. You will take each of these examinations via Blackboard using the Respondus LockDown monitor/browser.

#### Class Engagement (35%)

Students are expected to actively engage the material presented in the class. Such engagement may include, but is not limited to comping class assignments, verbal discussion with the course instructor and with each other. This may occur outside of class (e.g., homework) in the classroom (for face-to-face students), or in live collaborate sessions (for online students).

#### Term Paper (35%)

Students will write a term paper over a social problem using the outline below. The paper must use the textbook AND at least 10 peer-reviewed journal articles. The paper must be 10 pages in length, including title page and references, using the most current edition of APA style. The following outline provides for the structure of the paper:

- I. Introduction to the Specific Social Problem (SLO #2: Communication Skills)
- II. Conceptualize the Specific Social Problem (SLO #3: Empirical/Quantitative Skills)
  - A. Why is this a social problem?
  - B. Theoretically conceptualize the specific social problem.
  - C. How does this social problem affect individuals?

- D. How does this social problem affect society as a whole?
- III. Review of the Literature over the Specific Social Problem (SLO #3: Empirical/Quantitative Skills)
- IV. What can be Done to Alleviate the Specific Social Problem? (SLO #4: Social Responsibility)
- V. What are Your Thoughts on the Specific Social Problem (SLO #4: Social Responsibility)
- VI. Summary and Conclusion (SLO #2: Communication Skills)

#### **Assignment Submission**

All assignments MUST be submitted through the Assignments link in the Blackboard site. This is for grading, documenting, and archiving purposes. Issues with technology use arise from time to time. For Online Sections: This class is asynchronous, meaning you do not have to be on-line at a certain time. There are readings which you will have to complete to be able to adequately complete assignments. In order to complete this course successfully, you do have to participate in all course activities (i.e. discussion boards, course projects, reflective logs, etc.). Students are expected to engage in course activities and submit work by due dates and times. The hope is that students will make substantive contributions which reflect integration of assigned materials as well as any outside readings as appropriate. Scholarly contribution is an expectation. For planning purposes, this class will probably require a minimum of 10 study hours per week on average. Note: There will be weekly collaborate sessions held in this course for you to ask questions and interact in real time with the course instructor and your classmates. These collaborate sessions will be recorded and posted in the course modules for students who need or desire a pure asynchronous experience.
