Course Description

This course will focus on four things: 1) personal history (narrative as well as visual); 2) family history (helping a parent or grandparent record their personal history); 3) genealogy; 4) the resources at ASU that will help you research and write effectively and efficiently. By the time you finish this course you will have completed video presentations that incorporate pics, videos and audio narration for you and a loved one as well as a 4-generation genealogy chart. As we learn how to organize and present personal and family histories, we will explore everything that ASU has to offer to help you succeed as a student.

Attendance

What's in a Name
David Allan Faught

I've always been baffled by people choosing to name their kid David. Yes, David slew Goliath and was a better king than Saul, but he also committed adultery with Bathsheba and sent her husband into battle to be slaughtered. It's like naming your child John Wayne Gacy because he brought so much joy with his clown act, never mind those 33 murders. Or Delilah, oh how that gal could tie knots and style hair, so just ignore the little issue of her betraying the man who loved her more than anything.

So here I am David, "the Beloved," Allan. The Allan part is for the doctor who delivered me and saved me. I'm not exactly sure how premature I was but it was between one and two months. My lungs were not developed, and I spent a few months in the ICU in an incubator. That's what my mom calls it, an incubator, as though I were a chick in an egg on a rack waiting to be mature enough to break out of my bubble and join the rest of the world. Being the youngest of 6 I certainly needed time to fortify myself from the onslaught of so-called loving I was going to get from my older siblings (It's amazing that my head is still attached from what I've seen of old home movies). My mom also likes to say that I only survived because a decade before I came along the Kennedy baby had been born with the same malady and medical science was inspired to find a way to prevent such a tragedy again. It seems I'm a veritable miracle of modern science and have no lingering effects from being stuck in an incubator most of the day and fed from a bottle.

What's funny about my parents naming me after my doctor is that he spelled his name Allen and that is the way I spelled my name up until I was 19 and went to get my passport in preparation for my two years in Ecuador. My entire life I had spelled my name with an e and it was all lies, lies on my report cards, on all my certificates and awards, lies even on official records. For this reason, any records of a David Allen Faught born August 28, 1973, in Midland, Texas, son to John and Needa Faught (yes, Needa is a real name) pertain to me.

My last name is German and is derived from Vogt.¹ When pronounced in German the name sounds remarkably close to a very offensive expletive in American English but in the past tense, as in "Olga, we are out of potatoes in the dead of winter and have no more sauerkraut. We are so *****!" I've always been told that Vogt is a title associated with the lowest ranking nobleman, something akin to a viceroy; however, my cousin, Ilsa Williams, who is herself German, recently told me that the Vogt is an archetypal figure in 19th century German literature and resembles the corrupt Sheriff of Nottingham in our Robin Hood. Somehow the corrupt fascist villain rings truer than the nobleman.

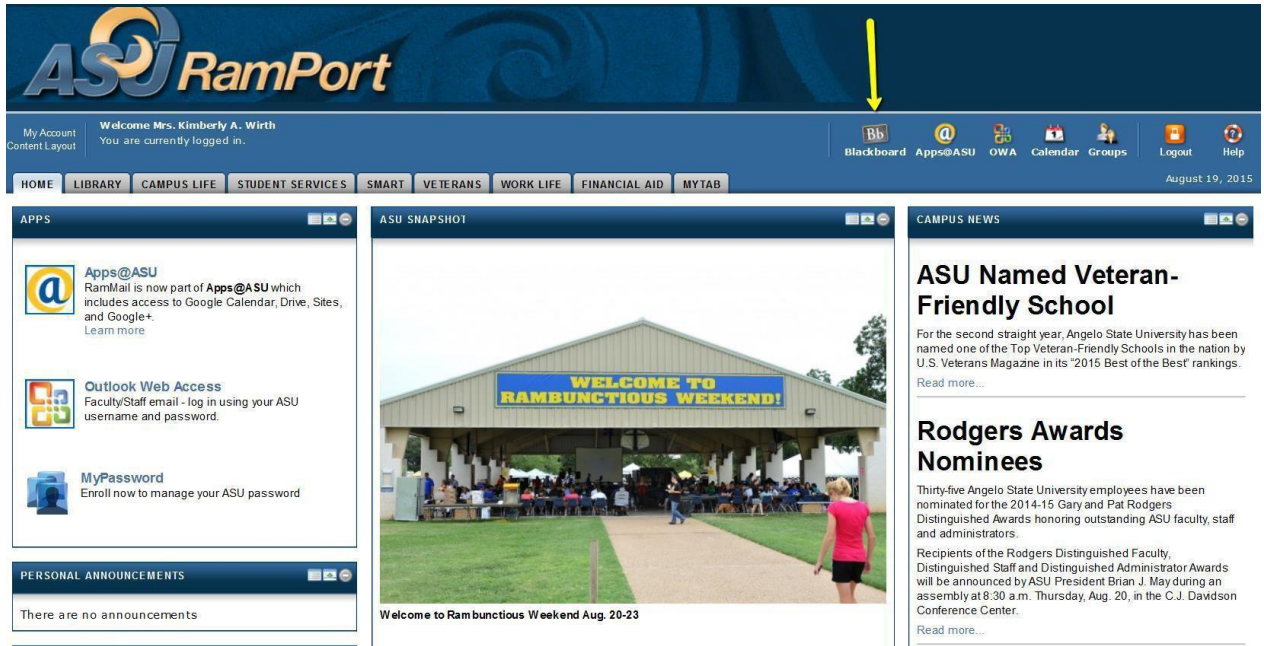

It's also fortunate that I was not named after any family or friends, so I haven't had to live up to any crazy expectations. As for nicknames, only a select few, mainly jock types and my sister Becka, call me Dave, which I can live with.

And that's the long and the short of the story of my name.

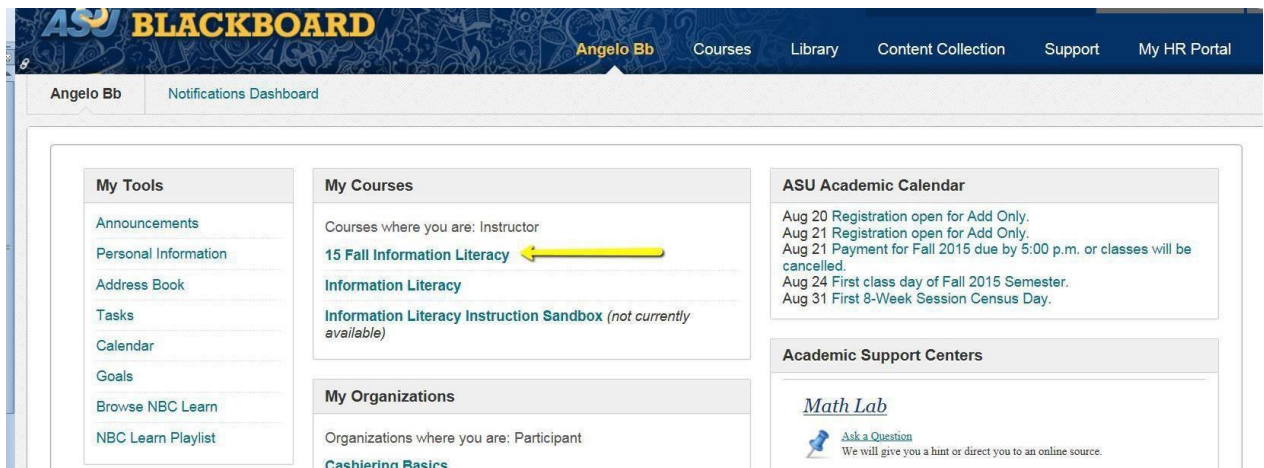
¹ On my father's side both of his parents were children of German immigrants who came to Texas in the 1850s and 1860s. My mother was a McMillan, which is Scottish. She also has English ancestors and has claimed for years that her grandmother was an American Indian because of her dark skin and her surname, Crowe. Looking through the census records I find no evidence of any indigenous blood in our lines and our Crowe ancestors settled in an English colony when they arrived on this continent (and always identified their race as Caucasian on every census). So I am 100% a white boy and have the name to go with it.

Accessing the Library's Information Literacy Blackboard Tutorial

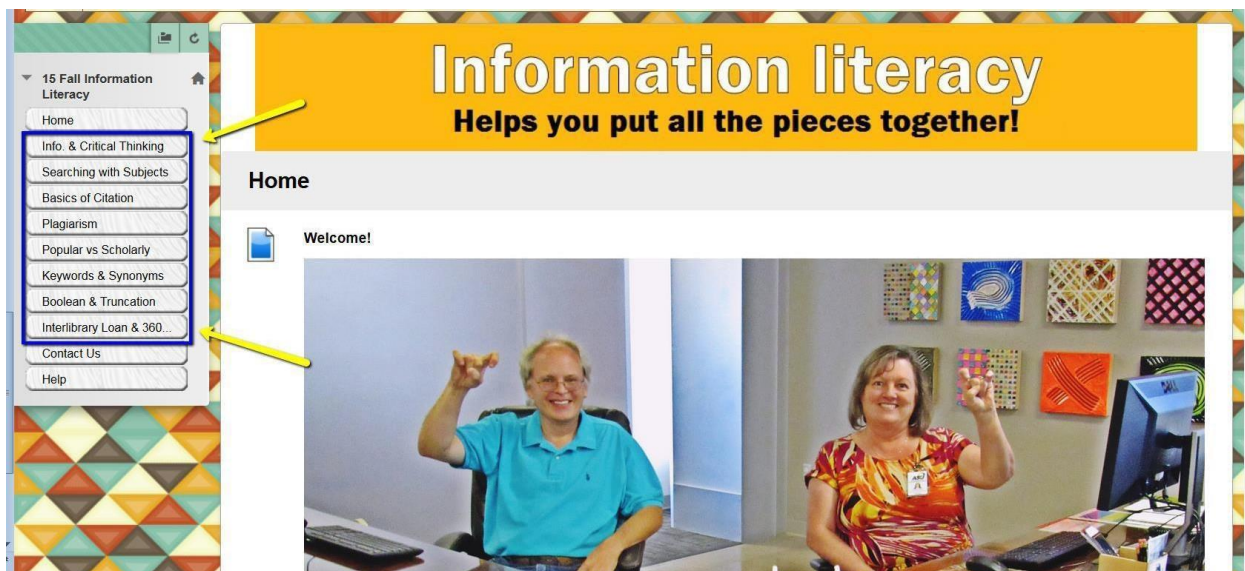
1. Access Blackboard in the upper right-hand corner of RamPort
