Course Information

Course Description

This course will focus on human infectious diseases caused by agents that are directly or indirectly transmissible from animal species to humans. This class will include topical zoonoses such as those caused by coronaviruses as well as classic zoonoses such as plague.

Prerequisite Skills

Accessing Internet websites, including Blackboard, and proficiency with Microsoft Word and/or PowerPoint are all expectations of this course.

Student Learning Outcomes

Upon completion of this course, students will be able to:

- Have a general understanding of zoonotic diseases, their causative agents, reservoirs, and vectors
- Have a general understanding of how zoonoses are transmitted
- Understand how these microorganisms cause disease in hosts at a molecular level
- Recognize the important interplay between host and pathogen
- Be able to effectively communicate about zoonoses using specific terminology

Course Delivery

This is a face-to-face course with online components that students are expected to access in [Blackboard](#).¹
