Course Description

This is a course in critical thinking and writing across the curriculum, including the research process and the research paper. Prerequisite is successful completion of English 1301 or its equivalent.

Email and Office Hours

Required Text

The Language of Composition 3rd edition is the main textbook that will be used in this course. A class set will be available, and students will have access to an electronic copy of the textbook as well. All other reading materials will be provided in class and/or available online.

Required Supplies

Wide ruled notebook paper, composition notebook, highlighters, pencils, blue or black pens, and a folder

Academic Integrity

1. Turning in an assignment that has been purchased, borrowed, or downloaded from another student or an online term paper generator or mail order provider
2. Cutting and pasting information from a resource without giving proper acknowledgment of the source
3. Using direct quotations or paraphrasing without giving proper acknowledgment of the source
4. Missing, forgetting, or intentionally mis-citing or not citing sources
5. Recycling old papers written by self or other students (All work must be original for this class.)
6. Any other intentional or unintentional copying or use of another's ideas being passed as your own

Cheating

Cheating includes, but is not limited to, the following:

1. Obtaining an exam by stealing or collaborating with other students to provide the exam outside of the instructor's knowledge
2. Discovering or searching for test content before an exam is given
3. Using an unauthorized resource during a test
4. Copying another's work during a test, quiz, or regular class assignment, or sharing your work with another student
5. Rewriting another's work to either turn in as your own, or to aid another student by changing her original content
6. Taking pictures of tests, quizzes, or assignments in order to share with other students or use in any unauthorized manner

This course will include research, reading assignments, class discussions, presentations, multiple choice responses to texts, short answer responses to texts, essays, journal entries, and exams. Grades are calculated by an average of all graded assignments. No assignments will be dropped, and no extra credit will be given.

Written Assignments

This is a writing intensive class. Be prepared for several lengthy written assignments along with smaller writing assignments.

Student Learning Expectations and Outcomes

1. Use the writing process as a form of learning, critical thinking, and communicating.
2. Communicate in writing effectively with audiences from a variety of disciplines.
3. Locate, evaluate, and integrate resources from the ASU library into your writing, including RAMCAT and other databases.
4. Conduct a methodical research process to complete an academic research essay.
5. Practice source attribution, synthesis, and citation style properly for academic research purposes.
6. Develop skills in expressing yourself in writing.
7. Learn how to find and use resources for answering questions or solving problems.
8. Learn to analyze and critically evaluate ideas, arguments, and points of view.
