Course Description

Introduction to the scientific study of factors underlying behavior. In addition to the physiological bases of behavior, other factors such as intelligence, learning, motivation, emotion, and perception are covered.

Course Credits

Class Sessions

- Most the in-class meetings will be lecture and class activities.

- While some lecture materials will overlap with book material, I will be expanding and clarifying book information through research and application-based experiences.

Readings

• It is expected that each student will have the required reading and activities completed <u>before</u> the class during which we will discuss the material (see course schedule). Some material in the text may be challenging upon first read, but lectures will be easier to follow if you have read the chapter. Hardcopies of our textbook are available in class. E-Book options will be provided to students to access using their tablets or other technological devices.

Discussion Boards (10 points each)

Throughout the course you will be asked to submit a response to a discussion board on Blackboard for most weeks (see class schedule below). There are 10 discussion boards in total. The discussion boards will ask you for your reflection/reaction to the content presented that week in the class materials and readings. Discussion boards will be evaluated on depth and level of personal analysis and reflection to the prompts provided. There is no "right or wrong" answer, however responses should reflect your own ideas and thoughts in regard to course content for credit. All discussion boards are due at 11:59pm on Thursdays. Failure to submit before due date will result in a "0" for the late discussion board submission.

Chapter Quizzes (10 points each)

Throughout the course you will complete 11-chapter quizzes. The lowest quiz grade will be dropped/exempt. The quizzes will evaluate the student's understanding of the course material presented in the assigned chapter for the week. Quizzes may include up to 20 quiz questions. Thorough chapter notes taken on Tuesday and Thursday classes with Mr. Jeremy Ochoa and signed by him on Thursday can be used to complete the quiz.

Papers

- Students will complete one (1) research paper and one accompanying course project (media/visual presentation of the paper) (100 points each) in the semester.
- Papers will be due as a hard copy at the start of class on the assigned due dates.
 - All paper assignments will also be turned in on turnitin.com prior to the class on the date that the paper is due. Papers that are not submitted electronically will not be graded.
 - Unless a direct quote is necessary to convey meaning, it is always better to use your own words to complete an assignment. Using your own words demonstrates your understanding of the material, and will result in a higher grade overall.
- Originality reports can be seen once papers are submitted through Turnitin, and it is the student's responsibility to monitor their own reports. Papers may be corrected and resubmitted as needed until the final due date. Please allow up to 24 hours for a report on a resubmission. Starting early is important to allow time for revision. No late assignments will be accepted and no make-up assignments will be given.

APA Style

- Title page with running head.
- Page numbers in upper right hand corner.
- References used must be cited in APA format. (Two sources required)
- Double spaced with 1" margins.
- 12pt font, Times New Roman.
- UTILIZE RUBRIC to ensure guidelines for paper are met.

The APA publication manual may assist you in writing in APA style. The instructor may also aid in understanding APA format as needed during student hours; however I will not be available to proofread your papers.

I do not do curves. I also do not give you a grade. You earn a grade based on your mastery of the material.

If your grade is borderline (less than 2 percentage points from the next letter grade), I will consider increasing your grade. An increase will be based on your demonstration of professionalism and continuous/consistent effort, not begging or pleas. Therefore, please avoid the end of the semester emails. Instead complete your work fully and seek assistance early in the semester if you are struggling.

Teaching Strategies

Students are expected to be "active learners." Being present during lectures and <u>participating</u> in class discussions will aid in your learning the course material and meeting the course goals. Participating in class also means reducing personal distractions such as completing work for other classes and limiting electronic use (i.e., phones, laptops, tablets) to only class purposes (i.e., taking notes, completing in-class assignments). It is a basic assumption of the instructor that students will be involved (beyond the materials and lectures presented in the course) discovering, processing, and applying the course information using peer-review journal articles, researching additional information and examples on the Internet, and discussing course material and clinical experiences with their peers.

Assignment and Activity Descriptions

Each assignment and in-class activity are designed to assess the student's ability to apply concepts and principles of psychology being learned in any given chapter. Some activities will

also include standardized measurements for the students in face-to-face classes to help them learn a bit more about themselves and how psychology may be applied to their lives.

Assignment Submission

All assignments MUST be submitted at the beginning of the class in which they are due. All discussion assignment will be due on Wednesdays and quizzes, exams, papers and other in-class activities will be provided on Friday.

POLICY ON LATE OR MISSED ASSIGNMENTS

Acceptance of any late work must be approved by me on a case-to-case basis. Due dates and times for assignments are posted. Failure to submit your assignments on the assigned date will result in a five percent late penalty deduction for each day after the posted deadline.
