**Title:** Global Insecurity: Causes and Solutions

**Course Description:** This course will explore hyper conflict and hyper security in both a theoretical and practical sense. **Lesson Objectives for Directed Studies Course:**


- Investigate key theoretical approaches to postmodernity and global security.
