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Course Information

Course Description

A study of the design and implementation of operating systems; analysis of system resource management, including the memory, processor, device, and file management functions.

Prerequisite Courses

Prerequisites: Computer Science 2336, 3304.

Student Learning Outcomes

The overarching theme of the Operating Systems course is an exploration of process, memory, and device management required to support computation. The four main course outcomes that align with this exploration are:

1. That students be able to identify the components and commensurate management of computer hardware required for a process to execute correctly. This includes the topics of scheduling, thread dispatch, and resource isolation/process protection.
2. That students possess an understanding of memory management required to support concurrent processing and multi-threaded environments.
3. That students be able to fully describe the roles played by input/output devices and filesystems in support of process execution.
4. That students be able to describe and provide solutions for issues that arise in concurrent and distributed programming situations which lead to deadlock.

Course Delivery

To maintain academic quality while accommodating social distancing needs this semester, this course will use a split delivery model that combines face-to-face teaching with remote instruction.

The goal is to provide face-to-face instruction to students who want to return to campus, while also allowing students who may need to learn remotely to participate via virtual class sessions.

How Does It Work?

When you are not in the physical class, you will attend live remote sessions at the same time as our scheduled course. You will also be expected to complete coursework via [Blackboard](#).¹

Technology Requirements

You need a computer to do your assignments, study the material, and practice the subjects at home. Required Use of Masks/Facial Coverings by Students
