Course Description

The goal of this offering is the review of three interrelated themes: 1) globalization and its social, economic, political, and cultural consequences; 2) comparative social policies; and, 3) social and economic development as strategies of change and progress. To accomplish these, an

understanding of socio-cultural differences is crucial to practice overseas or in our own internationalized communities. Topics to be covered will include, but not limited to: AIDS/HIV, migration, refugees, healthcare, human trafficking, and human rights.

Course Introduction

This course provides an introduction to social work practice in an international context. Students will have the opportunity to study several different theoretical models to consider processes of social development in a global, cross-cultural context. Dynamics of power in global social work will be a central focus, as will understanding the diverse roles and activities that social workers play in different countries and when practicing in another country. Since international social work practice is a relatively new field, the focus of the course is on helping each student develop her/his conceptualization of international social work practice, including the areas of policy planning, program administration, direct practice, consultation, and research; and working with at risk populations not limited to: migration, human trafficking,

human rights, HIV/AIDS, street children, orphans, post-conflict reconstruction, and refugees. For instance, aspects of international social work practice can include: advocate, practitioner with individuals, families, and groups, consultant, educator, and researcher.

Social workers understand that engagement is an ongoing component of the dynamic and interactive process of social work practice with, and on behalf of, diverse individuals, families, groups, organizations, and communities. Social workers value the importance of human relationships. Social workers understand theories of human behavior and the social environment, and critically evaluate and apply this knowledge to facilitate engagement with clients and constituencies, including individuals, families, groups, organizations, and communities. Social workers understand strategies to engage diverse clients and constituencies to advance practice effectiveness. Social workers understand how their personal experiences and affective reactions may impact their ability to effectively engage with diverse clients and constituencies. Social workers value principles of relationship-building and inter-professional collaboration to facilitate engagement with clients, constituencies, and other professionals as appropriate.

Competency 7: Assess Individuals, Families, Groups, Organizations, and Communities

Social workers understand that assessment is an ongoing component of the dynamic and interactive process of social work practice with, and on behalf of, diverse individuals, families, groups, organizations, and communities. Social workers understand theories of human behavior and the social environment, and critically evaluate and apply this knowledge in the assessment of diverse clients and constituencies, including individuals, families, groups, organizations, and communities. Social workers understand methods of assessment with diverse clients and constituencies to advance practice effectiveness. Social workers recognize the implications of the larger practice context in the assessment process and value the importance of inter-professional collaboration in this process. Social workers understand how their personal experiences and affective reactions may affect their assessment and decision-making.

Competency 8: Intervene with Individuals, Families, Groups, Organizations, and Communities

Social workers understand that intervention is an ongoing component of the dynamic and interactive process of social work practice with, and on behalf of, diverse individuals, families, groups, organizations, and communities. Social workers are knowledgeable about evidence-informed interventions to achieve the goals of clients and constituencies, including individuals, families, groups, organizations, and communities. Social workers understand theories of human behavior and the social environment, and critically evaluate and apply this knowledge to effectively intervene with clients and constituencies. Social workers understand methods of identifying, analyzing and implementing evidence-informed interventions to achieve client and constituency goals. Social workers value the importance of inter-professional teamwork and communication in interventions, recognizing that beneficial outcomes may require interdisciplinary, inter-professional, and inter-organizational collaboration.

Teaching Strategies

Students are expected to be “active learners.” It is a basic assumption of the instructor that students will be involved (**beyond the materials and lectures presented in the course**) discovering, processing, and applying the course information using peer-review journal articles, researching additional information and examples on the Internet, and discussing course material and clinical experiences with their peers.

Assignment and Activity Descriptions

Group Assignments (40%)

Each week starting Week 2 each group will respond to a topic that will be provide to you by the instructor covering a social work theme occurring internationally. The group will be expected to identify possible solutions, identify how social work values/ethics are apply, any human rights violations, and any oppression, discrimination, or marginalization that might be occurring. Your group postings will include a citation from the textbook, at least 3 peer reviewed journal articles, and will include a reference list.

Journal Postings (20%)

Each student will post a response to a weekly Journal posting (four), which will be due each Friday by 5:00 pm (1700). Student responses will be in APA format using citations and references. There does not need to be a cover page or abstract page. Students must have a citation from the textbook, one citation from a peer-reviewed journal article, and one citation from another professional source (website, another textbook, or another peer-reviewed article) for a total of three references per submission.

Examinations (40%)

There will be four (4) essay examinations in this course. Each of these examinations is worth 10% of your total course grade, and will be delivered via Blackboard.

Assignment Submission

All assignments MUST be submitted through the Assignments link in the Blackboard site. This is for grading, documenting, and archiving purposes. Issues with technology use arise from time to time. For Online Sections: This class is asynchronous, meaning you do not have to be on-line at a certain time. There are readings which you will have to complete to be able to adequately participate in individual and group assignments. In order to complete this course successfully, you do have to participate in all course activities i.e. discussion boards, course projects, reflective logs, etc. Students are expected to engage in course activities and submit work by

due dates and times. The hope is that students will make substantive contributions which reflect integration of assigned materials as well as any outside readings as appropriate. Scholarly contribution is an expectation. For planning purposes, this class will probably require a minimum of 10 study hours per week on average. **Note:** There will be weekly collaborate sessions held in this course for you to ask questions and interact in real time with the course instructor and your classmates. These synchronous (i.e., real-time) will be scheduled for TBD.
